

OBERON GARDEN CLUB INC.

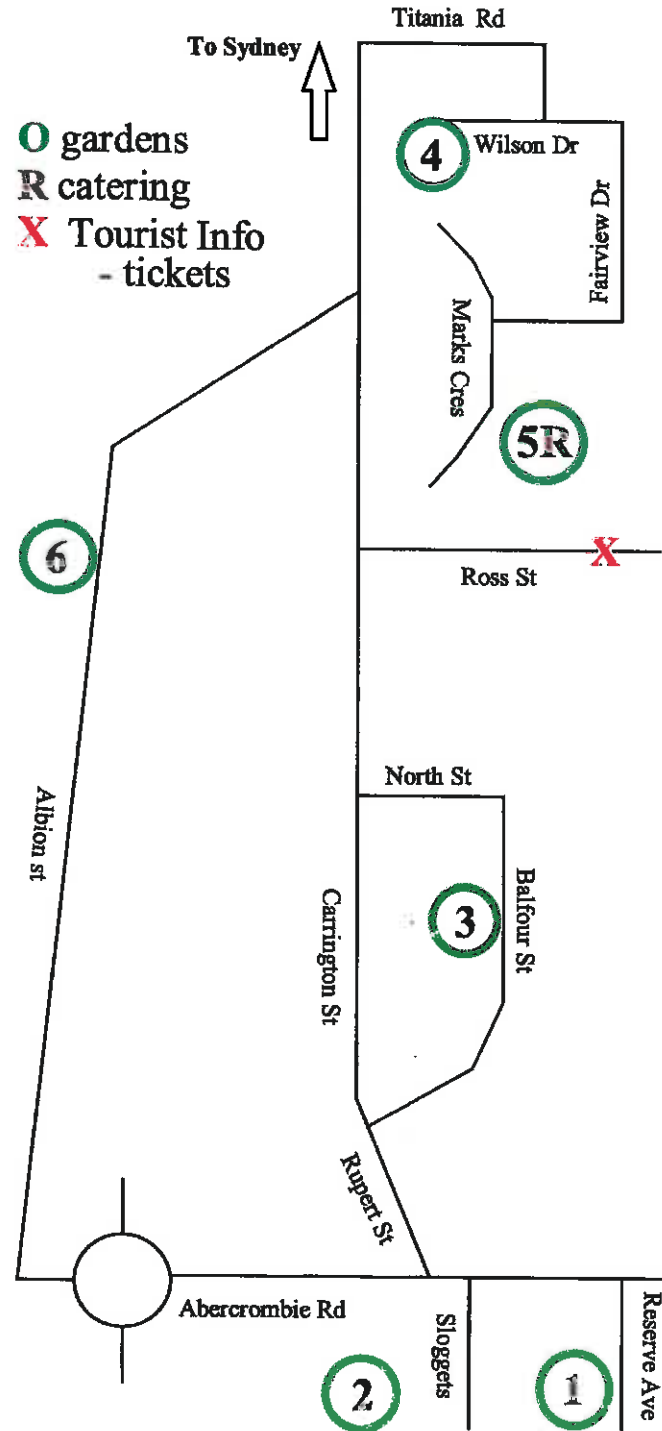
The club was formed in February 1983 with 33 members, 4 of which are still current members.

GARDEN 1. "Beyond Avalon" - Rosalie Pollock

68 Reserve Ave Black Springs

A large garden 5 acres started from a bare paddock 8 years ago. Set out in different areas, there are woodland plantings in which the deciduous and evergreen trees provide a canopy for daffodils and shade loving plants as well as open grassed areas with island beds and borders. Hedges form 'rooms' containing themed plantings of cold climate bulbs, shrubs and roses. The garden is laid out so that you can easily stroll with constantly changing vistas, and includes a secret garden.



GARDEN 3. 29 Balfour St. Oberon - Nancy Brown

Begun in 1970, this garden contains some very large mature trees, including a variegated elm, golden ash, several Nyssa, crab apples, a large variety of maples and many rhododendrons. Under plantings include hundreds of hellebores, hydrangeas, lilies, daylilies and a variety of iris species. This is a large town garden, with an interesting layout that invites the visitor to explore the various pathways. Full of cold climate treasures collected over many years.



GARDEN 5. "Willow Dale" - Lorraine & Clive Fielding
74 Marks Crescent Titania Park

The property was purchased in 2000, the main attraction being the view. At this time it was a bare paddock except for a small group of native trees on the eastern side. Structure in the garden began by building two main retaining walls. Landscaping started 5 years ago establishing a garden on the view side of the property facing north. The garden as seen today is still a work in progress.



GARDEN 2. "Brydie Park" - Brenda Lyon

63 Sloggetts Rd Oberon

The previous owners had established a small section of the 3 acre area. After moving here in early 2010 the first project was to double the front area to create a colourful driveway with azaleas daffodils and alpine phlox. Two ponds have been revamped, now with running water and a collection of water plants. The gazebo creates a peaceful area to enjoy a quiet time with the rural outlook. A pergola & chamomile seat have been added this year. As you stroll around the meandering paths you can observe the many flowering shrubs and perennials such as mollis azaleas peonies, poppies and bearded iris which look their best at this time of the year.



GARDEN 4. "Narom "Grove" - Gary and Heather Moran
101 Wilson Drive Titania

This is the first time that this 3 hectare garden has been open to the public. It is still a young garden, but hard work and creative ideas mean that it is already a sight to see. Containing many different areas including natives, exotics, Japanese, conifers, deciduous, production, orchards and kids playground. It also tackles difficult site conditions including steep terrain and wet areas.



GARDEN 6. "Dunfarmin" - Robin Toedter and John Martin
200 Albion St Oberon

This extensive 2 acre garden contains a wonderful selection of mature cold-climate trees as well as many newer plantings. An avenue of English Oaks leads into the property. Sweeps of law lead to numerous pathways where the extensive collection of herbaceous perennials and shrubs including tree peonies, magnolia rhododendrons and dog-woods can be seen. Established windbreak provide essential shelter as well as being a great backdrop for the garden itself. A well-organised vegetable garden and orchard make the household largely self-sufficient. Here, raised beds make for more comfortable gardening. A great garden for appreciating what can be achieved in a cold climate, where the wide range of plants has been carefully chosen to provide
